SB 833 bill will prohibits a person from constructing or operating a solid waste landfill disposal facility in San Diego County if that facility meets both of the following conditions: 1)Any portion of the disposal facility is located on or within 1,000 feet of the San Luis Rey River or an aquifer that is hydrologically connected to that river, and 2)The disposal facility is located on or within 1,000 feet of a site that is considered sacred or of spiritual or cultural importance to a tribe, as defined, and that is listed in the California Native American Heritage Commission Sacred Lands Inventory.

The Integrated Waste Management Act along with the Planning and Zoning Law and California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) provide for an extensive process for the permitting of solid waste disposal facilities. The process used for siting these facilities is open to the public and allows for broad commentary from citizens. These statutes allow parties to challenge the environmental impact report, which would be required to be adopted. Furthermore, both Acts allow challenges to the permitting process when there are threats to drinking water or disturbances of sacred lands of Native Americans.
