

**SWANA Legislative Task Force Meeting Minutes**

*November 10, 2022*

*11:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.*

*Zoom Meeting*

**1. Administrative Items (11:00 a.m. – 11:42 p.m.)**

- a. Roll Call – Herb
  - i. The meeting was called order at 11:05 a.m.
  - ii. Introductions of Monique Gamma, City of Merced and Parveen Sandhu, Kings Waste and Recycling Authority. Chris Celsi transferred. Founding Chapter President will recommend a replacement.
- b. Approval of September 22, 2022 Meeting Minutes
  - i. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the September 22, 2022, LTF Meeting Minutes incorporating the grammatical comments from Mr. Kernkamp.
- c. Treasurer Reports for September and October 2022
  - i. Mr. Kernkamp reviewed the LTF's beginning balance, revenues, expenses, and ending cash balance for September and October 2022. The following financial data was summarized:
    - September 2022
      1. Beginning Balance: \$69,041.55,
      2. Revenues: \$6,680.57
      3. Expenses: \$5,243.68
      4. Ending Cash Balance: \$70,478.44
    - October 2022
      1. Beginning Balance: \$70,478.44
      2. Revenues: \$4,230.58
      3. Expenses: \$4,568.68
      4. Ending Cash Balance: \$70,140.34
  - ii. It was inquired to which events does the LTF receive revenue. This will be further discussed at the LTF annual meeting. It was recommended the LTF continue to accept revenues received from various sources to ensure sustainability.
  - iii. It was suggested the LTF should consider investing some of the cash balance into a CD or other means to help increase the cash balance.
  - iv. It was also suggested the LTF should consider a minimum operating cash on hand.
  - v. Mr. Kernkamp to contact City of Stockton to confirm payments for March and October of 2022. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the September and October 2022 Treasurer's Reports.
- d. Annual Meeting – Update
  - i. Edgewater will be the location for the Friday dinner. Approximate cost is \$2,000
  - ii. Tim Flanagan is the new president for big SWANA, and will be conducting a presentation at the annual meeting.

- iii. Evan Edgar will also be discussing ACF and ZEV matters.
- iv. Ms. Fajardo offered a tour of Miramar Landfill if the LTF was interested.
- v. Reservations for dinners will be confirmed by the end of the week.
- vi. On your own dinner will be at Miguel’s or Kona Kai (split-up tables).
- vii. Optional dinner cruise \$2,100 (3-hour cruise).
- viii. Ms. Fajardo to provide options for consideration.
- e. Work Plan
  - i. Mr. Kernkamp is taking the lead on the work plan and will send updates to the group.
  - ii. It was recommended to add the Little Hoover discussions about SB 1383 and the Zolly vs Oakland case to the work plan.

**2. Regulatory Update (11:42 p.m. – 12:09 p.m.)**

- a. CARB ACF/ZEV/SB 1383
  - i. Ms. Quiroz is currently monitoring to identify next steps. Several conversations are happening offline. SWANA LTF submitted the LTF letter and Ms. Quiroz testified at the October 2027 CARB public hearing on ACF.
  - ii. Ms. Quiroz is meeting next month with coalitions and key stakeholders to work on educating new legislators and their staff. More new moderate democrats. May want to develop white papers for new legislators.
- b. Little Hoover Commission
  - i. They will issue their final report on SB 1383. They have had multiple hearings on understanding the challenges on implementing SB 1383. They are interested in cost to implement the state mandates. The Commission may make recommendations to the governor and legislators. They are an independent oversight agency that reviews state operations and legislation in place and provide recommendations.
- c. Mr. Mohajer sent a Lithium-Ion Battery Letter
  - i. Mr. Mohajer would like the content from letters to be incorporated into the work plan.
  - ii. Mr. Mohajer mentioned there is only one lithium-ion recycling facility.
- d. ARB workshop on Dec 5, regarding landfill emissions. Mr. Caponi and Ms. Hanson plan on being on the call.
- e. SWANA National will be commenting on PFAS.

**3. Legislative Capitol Update (12:09 p.m. – 12:52 p.m.)**

- i. There was a 14.5% veto rate during this legislative cycle. The governor signed over 900 bills. Common theme was ongoing fiscal costs to the departments. May get push back with 33 new members in state legislature for bills that add additional cost to departments with no additional revenue. Dem caucus meeting today. Anthony Rendon is now speaker to the assembly. There may be a transition of speakers. This is critical to how committee make-up is established. Mid to late December committees are updated.
- ii. There is additional discussion with SB 1383 procurement requirements.
- iii. \$180 Million is being allocated to CalRecycle for Organics. Ms. Quiroz spoke with Rachel Wagner on how they plan to utilize the funding. No details currently available on planned allocations.
- iv. Legislation is working on fixing SB 54. SB 54 will be monitored and added to future agenda. Two NGO groups will be involved to address this bill.
- v. CalRecycle is working on hiring staff for SB 54 alone.
- vi. Mr. Kobold emailed a presentation that was conducted on November 3<sup>rd</sup>, to recap the solid waste bills.

This bill is estimated to cost millions of dollars that would result in increased Environmental Fee rates or General Fund resources for the new contract, staff support, and state oversight responsibilities.
