- a. Roll Call, Introductions *Meeting called to order 10:12 am April 10, 2023 Meeting called to order 2:03 pm*

- e. Debrief of Officers' Meetings with Legislators *Legislator meetings went well, EOL was the concept. Their purpose to inform what SWANA does.*

**2. Legislative Review (10:30 a.m. – 11:30 p.m.)**

- a. [AB 2 \(Ward\) Recycling: solar photovoltaic modules.](#) *Support in concept.*
  - i. This bill states it is the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation that would create a convenient, safe, and environmentally sound system for the end-of-life management of photovoltaic modules, minimization of hazardous waste, and recovery of commercially
- b. [AB 573 \(Garcia\) Organic waste: meeting recovered organic waste product procurement targets.](#) *Watch*
  - i. This bill would require the State Air Resources Board 1383 regulations to allow a local jurisdiction, until December 1, 2039, in procuring recovered organic waste products to meet the target procurement requirements, to use California-derived recovered organic waste that the local jurisdiction sends for processing at a facility or operation outside of the state that meets certain conditions, as provided.
- c. [AB 592 \(Wilson\) Vehicles: waste hauling.](#) *Watch*
  - i. Allows Contra Costa County, or any other county, to create a program to regulate nonfranchise waste hauling operations within the county.
- d. [AB 660 \(Irwin\) Food labeling: quality dates, safety dates, and sell by dates.](#) *Watch*
  - i. This bill mandates streamlined expiration date labels on packaged foods. This measure also prohibits use of consumer-facing "Sell By" dates to reduce confusion stemming from labels intended for food retailers.
  - ii. Position: Watch
- e. [AB 863 \(Aguiar- Curry\) Carpet recycling: carpet stewardship organizations: fines: succession: procedure.](#) *Support in concept*
  - i. Improve accountability for CARE or any other consumer-funded carpet recycling program by increasing civil penalties for violating relevant laws and making repeat offenders ineligible to run this program.

- ii. Increases penalties on violations of the carpet stewardship law. Makes a carpet stewardship organization that violates the law three times ineligible to act on behalf of manufacturers to administer a carpet stewardship plan.
- f. [AB 891 \(Irwin\) Beverage Container Recycling: Nonpetroleum Materials](#) *Watch*
  - i. Requires plastic beverage containers to meet minimum content standards for nonpetroleum materials.
- g. [AB 895 \(Chen\) Solid waste: management](#) *Watch*
  - i. Vehicle for incorporation of recommendations from Little Hoover Commission's SB 1383 report.
- h. [AB 909 \(Hoover\) Solid Waste Disposal and Codisposal Site Cleanup Program](#) *Support*
  - i. Makes illegally disposed hazardous wastes eligible for funding under the CalRecycle's illegal dumping grant program.
- i. [AB 1012 \(Quirk-Silva\) State Air Resources Board: mobile source regulations: lifecycle analysis](#) *Watch*
  - i. This bill would require the CARB, if it proposes a regulation that would require a mobile source to use a particular technology, to perform a lifecycle analysis that considers all of the environmental impacts of the required technology before the adoption of the regulation.
- j. [AB 1238 \(Ward\) Hazardous waste: solar panels](#) *Support in concept*
  - i. Requires DTSC to develop alternative management standards for recycling solar panels to reduce the regulatory burden on management and recycling.
- k. [AB 1290 \(L. Rivas\) Product safety: plastic packaging: substances](#) *Support*
  - i. This bill eliminates several problematic forms of plastics that contaminate recycling or pose a risk to human health, by prohibiting the use of PVC, PVDC, PET-G, or pigmented PET packaging, as well as prohibiting the addition of PFAS, carbon black, and oxo-degradable additives in plastic packaging.
- l. [AB 1489 \(Wood\) Solid waste: plastic food service ware](#) *Oppose*
  - i. Exempts from the definition of "plastic" food service ware made from polyhydroxy butyrate (PHB) and naturally occurring polymers made by living organisms, including, but not limited to, alginate, beeswax, chitin, natural rubber, polysaccharides, polyhydroxy butyrate, and proteins.
  - ii. Would exempt these products from SB 54 requirements.
- m. [AB 1534 \(Irwin\) Methane Emissions from Landfills](#) *Oppose unless amended, sub-committee formed (Frank C., Sharon G., Christina H., Herb C., Hans K., Deepti J., Curtis L.)*
  - i. Requires ARB to incorporate the use of remote sensing data into its landfill methane emissions regulations.
  - ii. Not in favor of requiring for all landfills. Subcommittee will draft recommendations regarding the required evaluation and when requiring remote sensing would be appropriate.
- n. [AB 1548 \(Hart\) Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund: grant program: recycling infrastructure projects](#) *Support*
  - i. Expands CalRecycle's existing solid and organic waste recycling grant program in three ways.
    1. Clarifies the what types of projects can be funded to help locals meet CalRecycle edible food recovery requirements.
    2. Seeks to provide seed money for locals to develop reuse programs that divert solid waste from the landfill.
    3. Requires CalRecycle to consider the project's benefits to low-income communities, in advantage to disadvantaged communities
- o. [AB 1594 \(Garcia\) Medium- and heavy-duty zero-emission vehicles: public agency utilities](#) *Support if amended*
  - i. This bill would require any state regulation that seeks to require, or otherwise compel, the procurement of medium- and heavy-duty zero-emission vehicles by a public agency utility to

- ensure that those vehicles can support a public agency utility's ability to maintain reliable water and electric services, respond to disasters in an emergency capacity, and provide mutual aid assistance statewide and nationwide, among other requirements. The bill would define a public agency utility to include a local publicly owned electric utility, a community water system, and a wastewater treatment provider.
- ii. Will request amendments to include the waste sector in this bill.
- p. [AB 1705 \(McKinnor\) Solid waste facilities: health protection zones.](#) **Oppose**
    - i. Prohibits establishing or expanding a transformation or EMSW conversion facility within a health protection zone.
    - ii. Because of how transformation is defined, would prohibit other processes such as pyrolysis.
  - q. [SB 244 \(Eggman\) Right to Repair Act](#) **Support**
    - i. Requires manufacturers of consumer electronics to provide replacement parts, diagnostic information, and service literature to consumers and third-party repair businesses.
  - r. [SB 303 \(Allen\) Plastic Pollution Prevention and Packaging Producer Responsibility Act](#) **wait**
    - i. Vehicle to address lingering issues with definitions and scope of CalRecycle's regulatory authority under SB 54.
  - s. [SB 552 \(Newman\) Solid waste: single-use foodware accessory and single-use food packaging.](#) **DEAD**
    - i. This bill requires food facilities to offer food and beverages on reusable foodware for those customers that dine in.
  - t. [SB 560 \(Laird\) Solid waste: extended producer responsibility.](#) **Support in concept**
    - i. States legislative intent to establish a framework for expended producer responsibility for the end-of-life management of covered gas cylinders.
  - u. [SB 568 \(Newman\) Electronic waste: export.](#) **Watch**
    - i. Conditions the export of electronic waste and covered electronic devices upon a demonstration [that capacity does not exist in California to safely and responsibly recycle that waste or device.](#)
  - v. [SB 615 \(Allen\) Electric vehicle traction batteries](#) **Support in concept**
    - i. Requires all electric vehicle traction batteries to be recovered, reused, repurposed, remanufactured, or recycled at the end of their useful life in a motor vehicle or other application. Requires vehicle manufacturers, dismantlers, and secondary users to be responsible for end-of-life management of the battery.
  - w. [SB 665 \(Allen\) Plastic waste: single-use plastics alternatives: working group.](#) **Sub-committee formed (Doug, Jim M., Chuck M.)**
    - i. Establishes a working group to create a framework for evaluating new material types as they are developed to inform state policy decisions related to marketing, handling, and disposal of those products. The working group includes CalRecycle, Department of Toxic Substances Control, State Water Resources Control, and the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment.
    - ii. Subcommittee will discuss recommendations regarding factors to consider when evaluating alternatives and additional stakeholders, such as the waste and compost industry, that should be part of the working group.
  - x. [SB 613 \(Seyarto\) Organic waste: reduction goals: local jurisdictions: low-population exemption.](#) **Priscilla to follow-up with parties to obtain more information.**
    - i. Exempts from SB 1383 regulations local jurisdictions that dispose less than 5,000 tons of solid waste per year and that have fewer than 7,500 people
  - y. [SB 615 \(Allen\) Electric vehicle traction batteries.](#) **Support in concept**
    - i. Requires all electric vehicle traction batteries to be recovered, reused, repurposed, remanufactured, or recycled at the end of their useful life in a motor vehicle or other

application. Requires vehicle manufacturers, dismantlers, and secondary users to be responsible for end-of-life management of the battery.

- z. [SB 707 \(Newman\) Responsible Textile Recovery Act of 2023.](#) **Support**
  - i. Creates a Responsible Textile Recovery Act to require producers to establish a stewardship program for collection and recycling of apparel and textiles that are unsuitable for reuse by a consumer.
- aa. [SB 751 \(Padilla\) Franchise agreements: labor impasse.](#) **Watch**
  - i. Prohibits a local government from entering into an exclusive franchise agreement for waste services, or an amended agreement, that contains a force majeure provision that can be triggered by a labor impasse.
- bb. [SB 752 \(Padilla\) Solid waste: collection service: disruptions. 'Chula Vista' Bill, commercial trash was not collected for 3 weeks - Watch](#)
  - i. This bill would require a provider of solid waste handling services to provide timely notice to its customers of a potential labor dispute that will disrupt the collection of solid waste. The bill would require a provider of solid waste handling services to provide a timely refund to customers following a failure to collect solid waste. The bill would also require the Attorney General to adopt regulations to enforce these provisions and to assess administrative penalties, as specified.
- cc. [SB 777 \(Allen\) Solid waste: reusable grocery bags and recycled paper bags.](#) **Support**
  - i. Limits how grocery stores can use the fees collected from distributing plastic bags as well as requiring stores to report how many bags they distribute and how much revenue they make.
- dd. [SB 806 \(Archuleta\) Trash receptacles and storage containers: reflective markings.](#) **Work in progress**
  - i. Spot bill to fix reflective markings for trash receptacles.



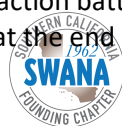
