- Legislation:
 - AB 1215 is rolling out (related to embedded batteries).
 - Definition: Car, scooter, and e-bike batteries are considered embedded batteries.
- Current Policy:
 - CalRecycle has adopted emergency regulations for embedded batteries.
 - There is a \$15 limit under SB 1215 for Battery-Embedded Products.
- Federal Update:
 - EPA will begin work on large batteries.

LEGISLATIVE FORECAST & PROPOSED ADVOCACY PRIORITIZATION

(Dylan Hoffman - Shaw Yoder Antwih Schmelzer & Lange)

2025 Legislative Session Summary

- Session End: Completed on Sept 13; Governor had until Oct 13 to sign bills.
 - 800 out of 913 bills signed.
- Key Influences:
 - Fire-related budget issues took precedence.
 - Federal cuts impacted transportation and climate sectors.
 - Consumer affordability was a major challenge, reflected in passed/vetoed bills.
- August Highlights:
 - Climate-related bills introduced: Cap-and-Trade, Invest, oil/refinery regulations.
 - Energy grid regionalization was a major issue.

Lobbyist Activity

- Bills Tracked: 60
- Positions Taken:
 - 29 bills:
 - Support: 15
 - Oppose: 4
 - Watch: 10

- Example:
 - SB279: Opposed; amendments rejected; bill signed.

Wins

- AB70, AB476, SB54 – Comment process (joint letter with CSAC).
- LMR comment letter and Coalition letter.

Looking Ahead – 2026

- Reconvene in January for the second year of two-year bills (must pass by end of January).
- AB28:
 - Top priority for LTF.
 - Partnered with RCRC; worked with Author's office.
 - Will return in 2026.
 - Action: Early engagement with Author's office – YES.
 - Subcommittee: Mike, Jim, Frank, Curtis, Deepti, Sharon, Larry.
- CARB proposals for LMR will impact AB28.

Other Bills

- AB80: Carpet recycling – monitoring; likely restart.
- AB762: Vape/Cannabis – LTF support.
- AB914: Indirect source bill – oppose.
- SB45: Tethered cap bill.
- SB501: HHW – may become \$50M grant program.
- SB561: Marine flares/EPR bill.
- SB594: Opposed – permitting new landfills (extra CEQA requirements).
- SB682: Support – PFAS ban.
- SB731: Bin labeling – date changed to 2025.

 - Work with partners without compromising LTF objectives.
 - Ensure equal partnership and ability to raise concerns.
- Partnerships:
 - Revive relationships with RCRC, League of California Cities, CSAC.

CARB ACTIONS DISCUSSION – Frank Caponi

Regulatory Updates

Advance Clean Fleet Regulation (ACFR)

- Before the Federal government could reject the waiver, CARB withdrew the waiver and put the Advance Clean Fleet requirements on hold.
- Applies to public fleets with contracted franchise haulers.

Landfill Methane Regulation (LMR)

- CARB needs to execute MOUs with all Air Districts before regulations become effective.
- Revised LMR focuses heavily on enhanced monitoring, which will be expensive.

- Remote monitoring is acceptable.
- Cover integrity program is unnecessary and costly to implement.
- Temporary issues:
 - Landfills are already covered under federal requirements, which should suffice.
- Alternate Compliance Option (ACO) will be eliminated, which could be problematic.

Toxic hotspot testing:

Implementation and testing costs will be high. There are efforts underway to create collective monitoring groups to do the source testing to determine which compounds will be required to be monitored. Timing is critical and a lot of work needs to occur in 2026.

SB 1383 Updates

- Merced Inspection:
 - CalRecycle inspected a site that requested an alternate compliance schedule under SB619.
 - Some jurisdictions have been removed from the non-compliance list after site visits.
 - Action: Document everything thoroughly.
- Procurement Targets:
 - Proposal to add biomethane as an eligible product.
 - Similar to AB70 and pyrolysis provisions. The bill includes 2 things: biomethane addition to eligible procurement products and adding a definition of pyrolysis to the Public Resources Code.
 - Most jurisdictions cannot meet procurement targets, except large composting sites with Direct Service Provider (DSP) agreements.

SB 54 Updates

- Regulation Adoption:
 - Expected by 12/31.
 - Rumor: 70–80% of grocery products may be excluded under waiver provisions.
- Regulation Package:
 - Concerns raised about money flow, implementation challenges, cost reimbursement, and ratepayer impact (HF&H submitted extensive comments).
- Processor Impact:
 - End market for recovered material remains a major issue.
 - Jurisdictions will be responsible for 40 out of 97 materials on the list.
- Other Notes:
 - Oregon is facing similar challenges.
 - Needs Assessment:
 - Expected to be 600+ pages (collection and processing facility data).
 - Will be presented to the Advisory Board.
 - Workshops: 11 held; comment period open until 12/6.

- Legislative & Regulatory Updates
 1. SB 212 – Medicine Disposal
LA County and LACSD have interacted with Med Project. Complaints from the public about bins not being emptied have been received. There seems to be low participation, but it is difficult to determine because tracking is at the statewide level. CPSC is gathering input from local jurisdictions/stakeholders and looking for opportunities to make improvements to the SB 212 program.
 2. AB 754
 - (Details not provided—should confirm if this relates to recycling or disposal requirements.)
 3. AB 1860 (Huffman Bill)
 - Since 2008, manufacturers are required to take back recalled products at no cost to consumers or retailers.
 4. DTSC EVQ Form
 - Due in March.

- More record-keeping requirements are coming in March.
- Action: Work with contractors to compile data into CY format.
- Webinar in February on how to fill out the form.

 - Goal: Strengthen partnerships and joint advocacy efforts.
